Why be a part of the Buddy

By being a part of the Buddy scheme, you will be able to:

- Gain excellent employability skills, such as mentoring, verbal communication and cross cultural communication (we have a lot of international members).
- Improve your communication and interpersonal skills.
- Meet new students who all kinds of cultural backgrounds.
- Find out the how the University runs and what services are on offer to students. This is great for both sides of the Buddy Scheme!
- Plenty of social opportunities, which means you can try an array of new things with your buddy!
- Find out more about how our Union runs. This could lead to you getting involved with various areas such as campaigns and societies.
- Access to references for your volunteering, as well as certificates of recognition.

Who are Buddy Scheme volunteers?

Buddy Scheme Volunteers are students who have spent a minimum of one term at Sussex University.

They have chosen to volunteer their time to help a new student (buddies) make the most of their time here at Sussex. You will be expected to make email contact with your assign buddy and organise to them person or communicate online as appropriate.

We also offer plenty of events that you can come to along with your buddy which will help them meet new people. This includes place like the Kew Gardens or sport events with Sussex's Active US project, which offers buddies affordable events including paddle boarding and badminton.

Buddies are students who have signed up to be in contact with a Buddy Scheme Volunteer whilst at university. These can be new students or students who have not been able to make the most of their time here on campus and in Brighton.

Our Buddies include international students, students undertaking postgraduate degrees and even mature students! It is an invaluable way of socialising and attending exciting events. Don't worry – the Buddy Scheme Volunteers will provide support and friendship to their buddies!



Steps to become a Buddy Scheme volunteer

- Read the volunteer role description, the <u>expectations</u> and the <u>advantages</u> of being part of the scheme to make sure it is right for you!
- If you are happy with what to expect (and what not to), complete the application form at www.buddyscheme.com/apply. Applications are currently open now!
- Look out for an email from us to subscribe to our newsletter (please also check your junk mail as it might be reverted it there). Also follow us on Facebook and Instagram— details can be viewed here
- Receive an email notifying who are Buddy/Buddies are! Matching will commence from A-levels results there and throughout the Autumn and Spring terms. Click here to find out how our we match!
- Contact your Buddy/Buddies via email as soon as possible. Introduce yourself, exchange contact details (it can be through Facebook, Whatsapp or anything you are both/all comfortable with). Start getting to know each other.
- If you have opted to meet your buddies in person, we recommend you meet in a public place on campus for the first meet. If you have a group of buddies: discuss with them whether they would like to meet in a group of individually first and choose a location that suits everyone!
- Prior to going for the meeting, put yourself in their situations. Try to recall how you first felt when you came to Sussex? They could be experiencing a bit of a culture shock or homesickness so think about:
 - 1. What helped you to settle and what did you enjoy doing?
 - 2. What do you love about Sussex university about Brighton? What are some of the activities you could recommend?
 - 3. Questions you would want to ask them and potential answers to questions they might ask you?

Steps to become a Buddy Scheme volunteer continued

- Your Buddy/Buddies should acknowledge that you are studying and other commitments too! Make it clear when you are available to meet and communicate and when you are not
- Attend our events with your Buddy/Buddies. Keep an eye on your emails/ website/ Instagram/ Facebook to get more information on our upcoming events.
- Continue to support your buddy for a minimum of 1 hour per week (per buddy) for at least the first month. This means that you will get to know your Buddy and give them something to do on a weekly basis as they settle in. Again, this can be through meeting up, chatting online or anything that suits you!
- We want to know how things are going. Is there any way we can help and mentor you? Feedback and suggestions? Find our contact details below to chat to us about any worries, doubts or awesome things you have experienced. We are here for you!

What to expect and what not to as a BUDDY SCHEME VOLUNTEER?

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What we expect you to do	What we do not expect you to do
We expect you to do your best to welcome your buddy (or buddies) to the University of Sussex.	To pick up your buddy from the airport if they are international – the University provides support to international students in getting from airports to our campus.
Signpost any services they may require and ask us if you're not sure.	Become best friends – you won't be expected to be in each other's pockets.
Offer support and encouragement.	Solve their social and personal problems – there are services at the university for this. All we ask for you is to support your buddy in finding the ones to fit their needs.
Maintain regular contact with your buddies.	Put yourself in a position where you feel uncomfortable. Remember we are always here to help if you feel this is the case.
Help them find activities they may be interested in, such as Union sports and societies.	Proofread their work or offer any kind of academic support. There are services at the University can help with this!
Respect confidentiality, unless you feel that your buddy is at risk to themselves or to others.	Be 'on call' for them – whilst it's great to keep a rapport going, there are no worries if you can't make it to the phone straight away!
Get involved in events such as trips and activities that are offered to you and encourage your buddy/buddies to join in with.	Offer money, skills or an uncomfortable amount of time. We understand that being a Buddy is voluntary and isn't about eclipsing paid work and more

importantly, your degree.

HOW do we match our volunteers and buddies

We match based on preferences chosen by you. So, you could be matched with someone who enjoys theatre or sport, or with someone who is similar in age or on the same course as you. This means that you'll get plenty of chances to find similar interests and stuff in common with your Buddy.

If you feel it isn't going well with your buddy, please do not be a stranger! Let us know and we'll sort the situation out for you. We understand that the Buddy Scheme is not for everyone. Although students have an amazing time though!

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SUPPORT SERVICES AT SUSSEX

Student Life centre

The student life centre is the first place to go with questions, queries, worries or concerns. They have an information desk that is open from 0900hrs to 1700hrs Monday- Friday and also offer email and phone advice in addition to face to face appointments and drop-ins.

Campus and Residential services

The CRS runs the residential life scheme on campus. It responds to critical incidents across the university and offers 'out of hours' welfare and emergency support when the student life centre is not open, after 5pm Monday to Friday and during the holidays evenings and the weekends.

Counselling service

The university counselling service offers free, confidential therapy to students at the University of Sussex
